Form of the present simple tense:

- + Singular subject + V + (s / es) + complement.
- + Plural subject + V (base form) + complement.

→ Affirmative

- Singular subject + doesn't + V (base form) + complement. \rightarrow Negative
- Plural subject + don't + V (base form) + complement.

- ? Does + Singular subject + V (base form) + complement? \rightarrow Questions
- ? Do + Plural Subject + V (base form) + complement?
