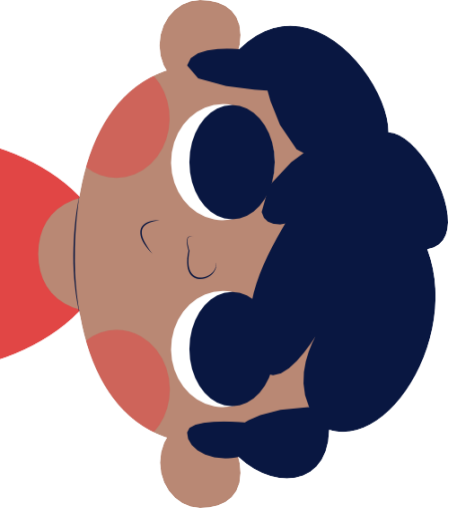

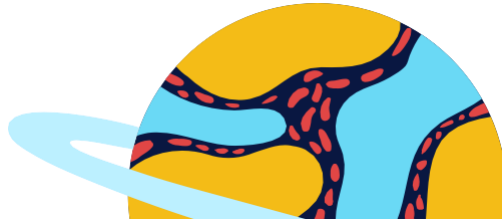
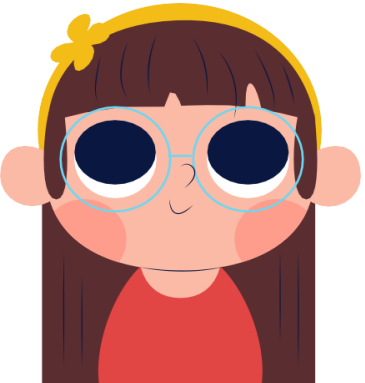

What are nouns?



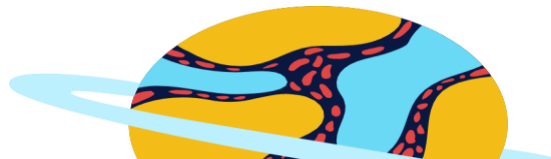
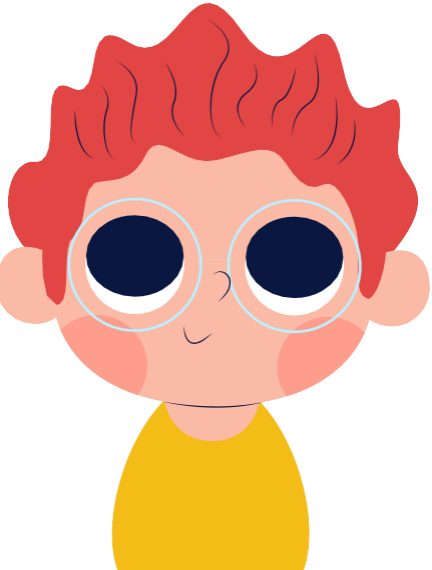
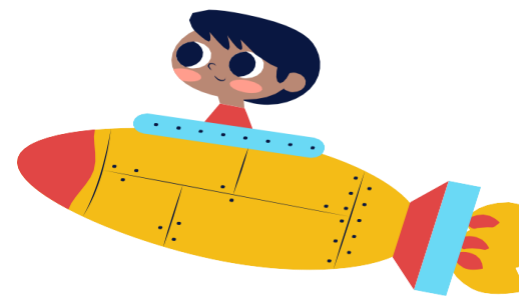
- A noun is a word that **names** something, such as a person, place, thing, or idea.
- In a sentence, nouns can play different **roles**.
- Nouns can come in two different forms:
 1. **Singular**, such as: dog, cat, teacher, chair, Tom... 
 2. **Plural**, such as: dogs, mice, teachers, chairs, cubes...

Types of Nouns

Countable Nouns

- They refer to nouns that **can be counted.**
- They have both **singular** and **plural** forms.
- Ex. : Apples, children, cookies.**

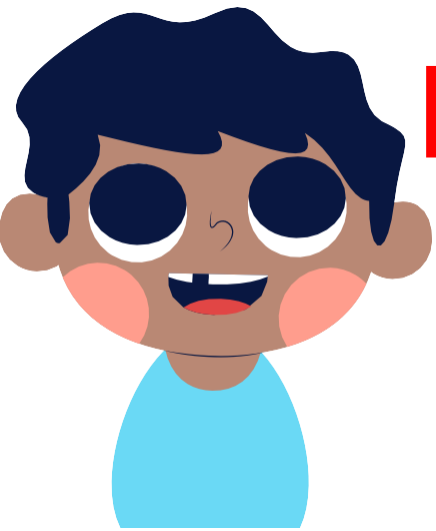
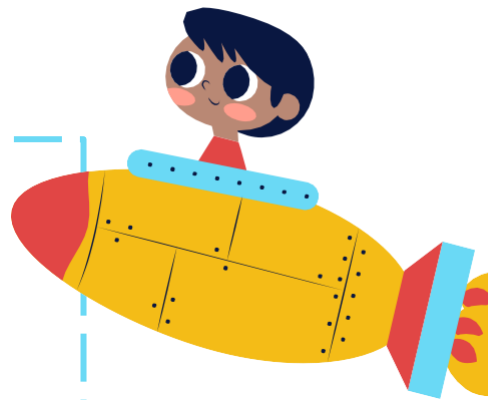
Uncountable Nouns

- They refer to:
 1. **Concepts or ideas**, like hunger and love.
 2. Things that are made up of **parts that are either too small, or too numerous to count.** For example: air, sugar, coffee...

Some and Any

Some

- We use “some” to talk about **countable** and **uncountable** nouns in **positive statements**.

For example:

1. I had **some pancakes** for breakfast.
2. I would like **some sugar** in my tea.



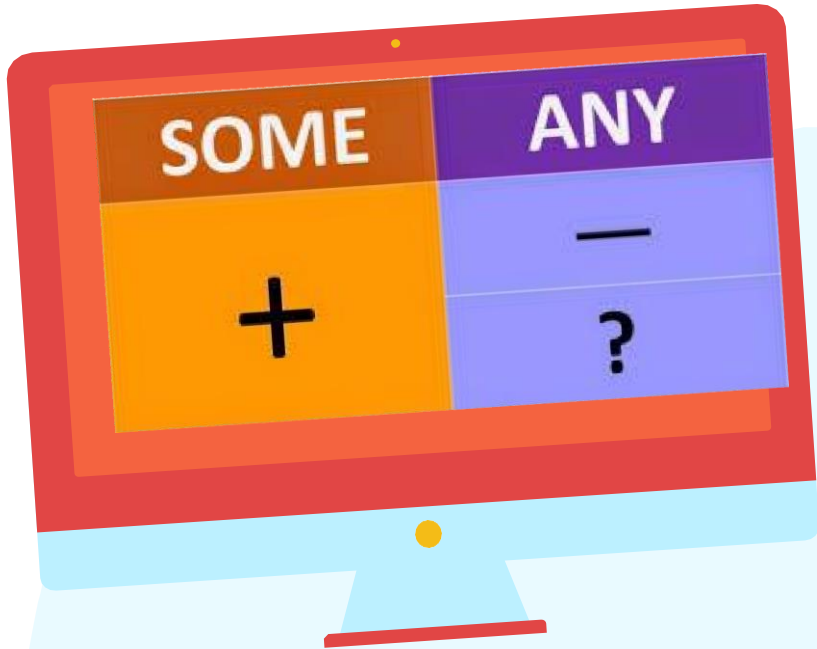
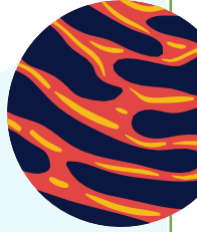
• Any

- We use “any” to talk about **plural countable** and **uncountable** nouns in **negative statements and questions**.
- For example:
 1. Lacy didn't find **any syrup** in the cupboard.
 2. Are there **any apples** left in the basket?
